Economic Development

The Economic Development department provides programs and services designed to increase the economic viability of West Baltimore residents and communities. We offer support for job seekers including occupational training and job placement services, financial education and low-cost tax preparation, access to healthy foods, neighborhood revitalization projects, and support for citizens returning home after incarceration.

Impact Story | Returning Citizens Program

I went to prison at age 17 with a sentence of 30 years. I had to do a lot of self reflection to figure out how to get through that time and decide what kind of man I was going to grow into. I created a few programs for gang and violence prevention behind the wall. After 17 years of incarceration, I found out about the program for returning citizens at Bon Secours Community Works, and I enrolled.

Coming home is scary. You already have a title on you, and people already have a stereotype of you. The Returning citizens' program is like a bridge that helps to get you through. A lot of guys come home, and everybody closes doors in their face, and then they fall back into their old ways because they feel as though there's no other opportunities for them. I think this program shows people that change is possible, but you have to want to put the work in. What you put into it is what you get out of it.

The Returning Citizens Program gave me skills, and skills build confidence. I had to humble myself, saying, "I don't have skills, but I want to learn." They helped me build a resume, coached me for interviews, and gave me my first suit. Their help made me feel like I was not alone. When you have people who are willing to vouch and stand up for you, it makes you want to fight harder.

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Youth and Family Services

The Youth and Family Services department offers programs and resources to assist West Baltimore families in building strong foundations for the future. Our programs target expectant mothers, children and their families, youth and young adults, and women in need of basic services.

Impact Story | Early Head Start

I grew up in Edmonson Village, and started visiting Bon Secours Community Works when my oldest son, Mason, was about a year old, and I was pregnant with my younger son, Chase. We got Mason enrolled in the Early Head Start program because it offered a lot of services that fit my needs. The program works with you from pregnancy up to age three to help make sure that kids are healthy and off to a good start educationally.

The staff at Bon Secours were very supportive. The home visiting program staff would bring books, diapers, formula and home supplies to me. They would also come and read to Mason, and there is a W.I.C. location in the building.

When Mason graduated from the Early Head Start program, he was potty trained and prepared for the next step in school. They really worked with the kids on building blocks, numbers, colors. They also learn hand hygiene, brushing their teeth, and imaginary play. Mason is now in Pre-K and Chase was accepted into a full-time Head Start Program.

In addition to resources for my kids, Bon Secours offers regular social events for parents.

We had socializations for holiday and seasons, fathers, and nutrition. When you're interacting with the other parents, you don't feel alone.

I think Community Works is a good place for parents who are low income or without a big support system. They really want to help you move up and transition in society. It's multipurpose so you can get everything you need in one place - that's pretty unique.

Our Housing and Community Development department provides safe, affordable, high-quality housing and resources for individuals, families, senior citizens, the formerly homeless, and people living with disabilities. We build state-of-the-art facilities and renovate existing rowhomes into low-to moderate income housing. We offer beautiful homes along with support from our Resident Service Coordinators at each location. We also collaborate with neighborhood residents to facilitate the creative development of outdoor places cast in their vision, in pursuit of strong, sustainable communities for people to live, work, and play.

Impact Story | Bon Secours Gibbons Apartments

Even though we both were from the same hometown of Florence, South Carolina, I didn't meet my wife, Arnethea, until after I had moved to Baltimore. We are both 88 years old, and we have been married for 62 years.

After my family had moved to Baltimore, Arnethea came up here to visit her cousin in the late 1940's, when we were both 16 years old. Her cousin and my mother were the best of friends. Time passed, and we didn't see each other again until 1956, when I was discharged from the military. I had gone on a vacation back to my hometown, and that's where I saw her again. Within two years, in 1958, we got married and she came to Baltimore to live with me.

We had four children – two boys and two girls. We lost our oldest daughter in 2009, and our younger son in 2012. We lived in the same house in Edmondson Village for 58 years.

Four years ago, we moved into Bon Secours Gibbons Apartments, and we have really enjoyed it. The people who manage the apartments, the neighbors, and especially the staff are really nice. We feel like it's a community environment. It's safe, and clean. We also like the parking area here, and the elevator. It's very convenient.



Place-Based Investment

We are investing in the community's vision.

We are working side by side with West Baltimore residents to create physical spaces that enhance the quality of life of our neighbors. To date, we have invested \$140 million in affordable housing, and an additional \$17.8 million in facilities such as our Community Resource Center, Early Head Start, urban farm, and community parks.

Wherever possible, we improve existing buildings rather than raze and rebuild. For instance, we modernize original row homes and renew them as offices and high-quality affordable housing. And, in 2022 we opened the Bon Secours Community Resource Center, which restored the former Hollins-Payson Enoch Pratt Library location that had been shuttered for decades as a hub for West Baltimore, with a focus on youth.

Our investments go far beyond the construction of facilities. We listen, partner, and work alongside our neighbors to determine the programs and services that will bring true value to the area. Then we build the infrastructure around their vision.

Bon Secours has a long history of uplifting the West Baltimore Community.

The Sisters of Bon Secours first came to Baltimore from Paris, France in 1881 to begin working in the United States. In 1919, they opened their first hospital. We embody our ministry's rich history as we look toward the future.

Through a century of change, our approach to community health has consistently reached beyond traditional models.

In 1991, Bon Secours Community Works (BSCW) was created, and we functioned as the community development arm of Bon Secours Baltimore Hospital. Since then, we have been busy working alongside our community leaders and residents to design and implement programs and services to address their holistic needs.

We address the vital needs of West Baltimore as we look to the future together.

In 2019, the merged ministry of Bon Secours Mercy Health made the decision to sell Bon Secours Baltimore Hospital while renewing the organization's commitment to Baltimore City through investments to expand Bon Secours Community Works, ensuring that it remains a pillar of community support for generations to come.
